

State and Local Governments Heeding Calls to "Ban the Box."

For the past few years employee rights groups have been pushing for legislation that makes it unlawful to ask about criminal history on an employment application. The movement, known as "ban the box" (named after the box applicants check when asked if they have ever been convicted of a crime) has now successfully pushed through laws in twelve states and dozens of counties and municipalities.

The ban the box movement arose from concerns over increasing incarceration rates for non-violent crimes such as drug possession. According to a recent study by the National Employment Law Project more than 65 million Americans have a criminal record that could show up on a routine background check. That amounts to about one in four adults. Thus, activists and lawmakers are concerned that the stigma associated with a criminal record could prevent these people from finding jobs.

It is already illegal in many states, including New York, to discriminate, absent a legitimate business reason, against prospective or current employees with criminal records. Moreover, the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has found that taking an adverse employment action against an individual for having a non-job related criminal conviction has the effect of being discriminatory, since certain minorities have higher incarceration rates.

What the ban the box advocates hope to achieve is to completely eliminate questions regarding criminal histories from employment applications. Up to now, four states have ban the box laws which apply to private employers (Hawaii, Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Rhode Island). In addition numerous local governments have passed similar legislation, including: New Haven, Atlanta, Chicago, Indianapolis, Baltimore, Detroit, Minneapolis, Newark, Atlantic City, Buffalo, Rochester, and Philadelphia. Some of these cities, such as Newark even go as far to only permit a background check after a conditional offer of employment is made. That means that you must hire the employee, on the condition that they pass the background check, and then perform the

check. This greatly increases the risk of discrimination suits if the employee is ultimately not hired for having a criminal record.

Furthermore, even where a permissible background check is conducted, an employer cannot make an adverse hiring decision unless there was a conviction, and that crime is job related. For example, an employer may be justified for not hiring a bookkeeper who was convicted of embezzlement, but not if they were convicted of public intoxication. Some other factors employers should consider is the severity of the crime, and the length of time since the conviction.

Despite these laws, employers should still engage in some type of background check, especially where employees interact with the general public. If an employee has a criminal record that includes a history of violence, and that employee assaults a member of the public, the company may be liable for negligent hire.

Thus employers must walk a fine line between avoiding liability for discrimination and for negligent hire. In light of the expanding ban the box movement the following procedures are suggested:

- Employers should remove questions regarding criminal records from their employment application.
- Employers should prepare a second form to be issued during the interview process which inquires into criminal history (be sure to ask about criminal *convictions* rather than arrests or criminal records).
- If your company performs background checks through a third party they would investigate criminal history. However, be sure to review with your background check vendor that they are in compliance with state and local rules.
- In locations where criminal record inquiries are prohibited until a conditional offer is made, employers must first conditionally offer the position and then ask about any criminal record. If this is the case, employers must be especially careful an adverse decision is made once the criminal history is revealed.

What makes this issue particularly confusing is the multitude of laws and regulations across local, state and federal governments. It is strongly recommended that you review both your state and local laws, and take all necessary steps to make sure you are in compliance, including revising your company's employment applications. Statement From Stuart S. Zisholtz, Esq.

Understanding and Reviewing Contract Documents

I have continuously written and lectured on the importance of reviewing and understanding your contract documents. Many times it is the difference between collecting and not collecting. The following scenario is a perfect example of a subcontractor not reviewing the terms of the agreement before commencing with the work.

In a recent case, a subcontractor was issued a term sheet. The term sheet required the subcontractor to sign the subcontract, permitted the general contractor time to execute the subcontract, and excluded the general contractor from being obligated under the contract or have any liability for work performed or anticipated profits if a fully-executed contract was not returned to the subcontractor.

A fully-executed contract was not forwarded to the subcontractor. The subcontractor claimed that the general contractor verbally agreed upon all of the material terms of the subcontract, including the price.

The subcontractor argued that it was awarded the subcontract and directed to proceed with the work.

After performing work on the project, the general contractor advised the subcontractor that it was not awarded the subcontract and requested the subcontractor leave the project.

An action was instituted by the subcontractor against the general contractor to recover the balance due as well as anticipated profits. The general contractor argued that it was entitled to terminate the subcontractor because it had clearly stated its' intention to be become bound under the agreement only after a signed written subcontract was delivered to the subcontractor. Since the term sheet was approved and accepted by both parties, the agreement did not come into effect until such time as a fully executed subcontract agreement was delivered to the subcontractor.

The lower court dismissed the complaint and the Appellate Division affirmed. The Appellate Division reasoned that the general contractor's conduct after the issuance of the term sheet did not waive or modify the terms of the term sheet, nor did it act as an implied acceptance of the underlying unexecuted subcontract. The Appellate Division found that the term sheet was a pre-contractual notice to the subcontractor and the subcontractor was bound by its terms.

Had the subcontractor reviewed and understood the various terms and conditions of the term sheet and the contract, it would have never commenced with work on the project and been in this situation.



Total U.S. energy production reached 81.7 quadrillion British thermal units (quads) in 2013, enough to satisfy 84% of total U.S. energy demand, which totaled 97.5 quads. Natural gas was the largest domestically produced energy resource for the third year in a row and, together with the other fossil fuels (coal, crude oil, and hydrocarbon gas liquids), accounted for more than three quarters of U.S. energy production. In total, the United States consumed 97.5 quads of energy, 82% of which was fossil fuels.
