

Beware Of New Employment and Labor Laws In New York

New York State has recently enacted several laws relevant only to New York employers. Each employer should pay attention to the following laws and adjust their internal policies, including handbooks, accordingly.

NY Bereavement Benefits to Same Sex Couples: Employers must now extend funeral and bereavement leave to unmarried same-sex couples. The bill prohibits discrimination by NY employers who provide such leave to other workers and becomes effective in late October of 2010. Bereavement is now available to same-sex couples who are in "a committed relationship," which is defined as "a long-term relationship characterized by emotional and financial commitment and interdependence." If an employer grants funeral or bereavement leave to an employee for the death of a spouse, child, parent or other relative, it shall not deny the same leave for the death of an employee's same-sex committed partner.

NY Construction Industry Fair Play Act: Construction workers are now presumed to be employees, as opposed to an independent contractors, unless three criteria are met: 1) they are free from control and direction in performing the job, 2) their services must be performed outside the usual course of business for which the service is performed, and 3) they are customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession, or business that is similar to the service at issue. industry employers are mandated to provide workers with notification of their classification status, and run the risk of both civil and criminal penalties for failure to do so. This law becomes effective in late October of 2010

- <u>NY New Quarterly Wage Report and New Hire</u> <u>Requirements with Respect to Child Support Orders</u>: This law compels employers to report on both quarterly wage and new hires reports when employersponsored family health insurance is available. This law does not become effective until July 15, 2011; however, it is beneficial to consider the impact of this legislation now, as implementing changes in HR polices could be time consuming.
- NY Unemployment Insurance for Non-Participating Employees Affected by Strike: This law affects only those employers whose employees are represented by unions. Previously, there was a seven-week waiting period for benefits which was applicable to employees out of work due to strikes emanating from other employers or from a bargaining unit of which they are not a member, as long as such employees did not participate in the strike. This is no longer the case. The law also reiterates that if a permanent replacement is hired by an employer, the waiting period is no longer applicable even if the individual is an active participant in the industrial controversy. This law became effective July 15, 2010.



Interns Are Not Free Labor

With fall semesters starting at colleges across the country, it is tempting for employers to recruit students for unpaid internships. But if you're thinking of cutting costs by replacing your paid employees with unpaid college students, don't. Doing so could create liability pursuant to the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act ("FLSA") as well as state labor laws.

Often, interns receive little or no pay for the work they perform. Many employers provide unpaid internships which grant students the benefit of on the job experience as well as class credits in some situations. However, unless the job meets certain conditions, interns are considered employees and employers must pay them at least the minimum wage under federal and state laws.

The FLSA defines an employee as "any individual employed by an employer." The Supreme Court has created a list of six criteria that characterize interns or trainees who need <u>not</u> be paid:

- The training, even though it includes actual operation of the employer's facilities, is similar to that which would be given in a vocational school;
- The training is for the benefit of the trainees;
- Trainees do not displace regular employees, but work under close observation;
- The employer that provides the training derives no immediate advantage from the activities of the trainees and, on occasion, the employer's operations may actually be impeded;
- The trainees are not necessarily entitled to a job at the completion of the training period; and
- The employer and the trainee understand that trainees are not entitled to wages for the time spent in training.

If the intern does <u>not</u> meet this list of characteristics, then they must be compensated at a rate of at least the minimum wage. Now is the time to review internships to see if these positions are classified and paid in compliance with federal and state wage and hour laws.

ASE Technicians Speak Out On Maintenance

Your vehicle's owners manual is helpful for keeping you up to date on the maintenance intervals and checks necessary to keep your vehicle running smooth. But some answers to the most commonly asked questions are not found in the manual. We have compiled a list of frequently asked questions about vehicles and vehicle maintenance, with answers provided by the ASE certified technicians at Enterprise Fleet Management.

How can I make my tires last longer?

Properly maintaining you tires including pressure, alignment and rotation is the key to making them last longer. Try to check tire pressure at least once a month and before any long road trips. If possible, have your tires rotated in conjunction with every other oil change. Tire rotation is important and can extend the life of the tires by as much as 20 percent. Another factor that can affect



the life of your tire is driving conditions such as on or off road, frequent turns, rapid acceleration and hard braking. Also, overloading the vehicle can cause extra wear on your tires as well.

Can I extend my oil change intervals by switching to synthetic oil?

Even with synthetic oils, you need to change your oil at or before the manufacturer's recommended interval. It is important to follow these intervals for preventive maintenance set by the manufacturer to ensure that the vehicle's warranty stays valid and the vehicle keeps running well.

What causes the foul odor when I turn on my air conditioner?

This is especially likely in humid climates. The most common cause for the air conditioner to emit a foul odor is that the evaporator case has collected moisture due to condensation. The mold and mildew left behind by the moisture causes the odor. In most cases, you can spray Lysol or a similar product into the system's air intake (usually located at the base of the windshield) with the blower on high to kill the odor causing mold. Some products available at local automotive parts vendors are specifically designed to fix this problems, but it may be necessary to have a professional automotive technician disinfect the evaporator case if the problem persists.

Do I need to take my vehicle in for a tune-up at 30,000 miles?

At 30,000 miles we do not recommend replacing your vehicle's spark plugs. Most of today's vehicles have engines equipped with platinum tipped spark plugs that do not require replacement for up to 100,000 miles. The only instance you would consider replacing these spark plugs prior to 100,000 miles is if you are experiencing drivability problems, poor fuel mileage or similar problems that can be attributed to the spark plugs. Consult your owners' manual for the recommended tune-up interval.

Why do the brakes on some vehicles wear out more rapidly than others?

There are several factors that can contribute to brake wear. A major factor is the quality of material used to make the brake pads. This depends on the make and model of the vehicle. Like the tires, the wear on the brakes is also affected by the driving conditions in which they are used. Whether or not they are used in the city, on the highway, or in a hilly or flat area makes a big difference on how quickly the brake pads will wear out. Heavily loaded vehicles and vehicles pulling trailers are also harder on brakes. The more stops the driver makes and, even more importantly, the more quick or sudden stops a driver makes, the more wear there will be on the brakes.

The filters that keep your engine clean and running smoothly should be examined regularly and changed when necessary. Engine oil filters should be replaced every 5,000 to 6,000 miles, along with an oil change. Air filters should typically be changed at 50,000-mile intervals or as needed. In situations where vehicles are operating in extremely dusty conditions, the filters should be checked daily or weekly and replaced when needed. The fuel filter should be replaced every 30,000 miles for gasoline engines and every 12,000 to 15,000 miles for diesel engines. Finally, the automatic transmission filter and fluid should be replaced at 60,000 mile intervals. If your vehicle is pulling a trailer, carrying heavy loads or doing a lot of stop-and-go driving, it may be necessary to service the transmission more frequently because transmissions in these situations can develop excess heat. Because vehicle specific service intervals may vary, check the vehicles owners manual.

Finally, remember always to pay close attention to the manufacturer's warranty information in the owner's manual. Failing to adhere to specific guidelines established by the manufacturer may prevent your repairs from being covered by warranty.

Statement From Stuart S. Zisholtz, Esq.

Home Improvement Licenses

I have written numerous articles about the necessity of a contractor to maintain a home improvement license when performing home improvement work. This license can be obtained through the local Consumer Affairs. Also, many local villages and towns have requirements that you obtain a home improvement license.

There are exceptions to the rule as to when you need a home improvement license. One of those exceptions is when you are performing home improvement work in the construction of a new home.

Recently, the Appellate Division, Second Department rendered a decision involving the construction of a new home in East Hampton. In that case, the contractor was not licensed with the village of East Hampton. However, the local village code excluded the necessity of obtaining a license for home improvement work where the work involved the construction of a new home.

As a result, the contractor was permitted to pursue its claim for the recovery of any balance due and owing.

In that particular case, the contractor was lucky. He

was able to pursue his claim based upon an argument that the home improvement license was not necessary. Had the contractor maintained a license, he would not have been in the predicament of trying to defend its claim and fall within the small exception to the rule.

For those contractors reading this article who perform home improvement work. I strongly suggest that you obtain a home improvement license. For those trades who have particular licenses, such as electricians and plumbers, there is not a need to obtain a separate home improvement license.

Never let your lien time run out!!
